

Journalism Needs to Build Strong Relationships

he Milwaukee Press Club's mascot is a mummified black cat. (See milwaukeepressclub.org for the entertaining story.) While the image of a black cat often conjures up thoughts of doom and gloom, it's anything but that with the press club. Perhaps Anubis is more of a lucky charm.

The club continues to be strong financially, thanks to a growing membership and strong programming. This has allowed the club to make a significant

annual donation to our endowment. Last year, the MPC Endowment presented a record \$30,000 in scholarships, grants and awards. This year marks the endowment's 50th anniversary in supporting the next generation of journalists. Congratulations to MPC Endowment President Joel Dresang and the entire board, and thank you to all who contribute to this worthy cause. We need to keep this going for the sake of journalism's future.

The students who continue to benefit from these honors provide hope in a time when journalism is fighting for its life. We need to help them and the rest of us in the fight. As Marquette's Shaka Smart would say, let's build relationships.

It's hard enough for veterans and early-career journalists alike to keep from getting discouraged, let alone students who are still studying journalism. We need to keep supporting one another and find ways to reach out and mentor our student journalists and those just beginning their careers. Try to spend some time with the MPC honorees, especially the students, and find out more about their award-winning journalism and what they're working on next!

Students and those early in their careers have great ideas. Listen to them. I was encouraged after reading a report in *Editor and Publisher's 25 under 35*, outlining ideas from young journalists about the future of our industry. A constant theme was community and telling stories across all platforms geared toward and about specific communities, especially underserved neighborhoods.

Relationships can lead to partnerships that have proven successful on both the collegiate and professional levels. This isn't a new idea, but it is one that's been building over the last few years. I know from personal experience how helpful and rewarding relationships can be. Milwaukee PBS has partnered with WUWM, Milwaukee's NPR, on the issue of lead in Milwaukee's water. We've also partnered with the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* on two of our award-winning documentaries, *Kids in Crisis: You're Not Alone*, on youth mental health, and on *America's Dairyland at the Crossroads*. This also has enabled both organizations to reach a wider audience.

Those relationships are beneficial, especially in light of shrinking newsroom staffs and budget cuts. According to *Nieman Reports*, over the past two decades, about 2,500 local news operations have closed — more than 360 of them in the past three years under additional

Covid-19 pressures. The country is on track to lose more than onethird of its newspapers by 2025. It's already lost more than a quarter (2,500) since 2005. NPR cut 10 percent of its staff in March. The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, owned by Gannett, America's largest newspaper chain, has experienced staff layoffs. The list, sadly, goes on and on.

Wisconsin journalists are still producing and writing meaningful, impactful and just darn good journalism, despite staffing shortages, limited resources, or other challenges. The Milwaukee Press Club's Excellence in Wisconsin Journalism Awards proves that. We have experienced yet another record-breaking number of entries, including an uptick on the collegiate level. Congratulations to all of the awardwinners! Be proud of your work and the audiences you serve.

Our Sacred Cat honoree, Anna Wolfe, an award-winning investigative reporter for Mississippi Today, is proud of her work including uncovering Mississippi's biggest welfare scandal and former Green Bay Packers quarterback Brett Favre's alleged involvement. The number of Freedom of Information requests she filed for this story alone is very impressive.

The Milwaukee Press Club once again has worked hard to do what we can to keep local journalism strong, often through our own partnerships. We've held successful Newsmaker Luncheons with WisPolitics.com, featuring community and government leaders including Milwaukee County Executive David Crowley, Milwaukee County Sheriff Denita Ball, and U.S. Senator Ron Johnson. Miss America Grace Stanke, a University of Wisconsin-Madison student, also joined us for a Newsmaker at the Rotary Club of Milwaukee, another MPC partner.

The club also held our first free professional development workshop on safety during crime coverage. It was nice to see some students in attendance for this one! The club plans to offer more of these workshops in the near future. Special thanks to board member Bruce Harrison from TMJ4 News for the suggestion and for organizing this workshop. If you have an idea for a workshop, let us hear from you!

Lastly, thank you to our Headliner Award winners Derek Mosley and George Stanley for all you've done in building relationships and in working to benefit our community.

And I'm grateful to all who support the Milwaukee Press Club and local journalism on so many levels. We need you more than ever. Thankfully, the cat's in our corner, too.

The Backstory to The Backchannel

How Anna Wolfe broke the story of Mississippi's welfare scandal and Brett Favre's alleged connection

request for her future boss when she applied for a job at Mississippi Today, an online nonprofit news organization. "Please hire me to cover poverty exclusively." It was a bold move that paid off big. Wolfe's effort and her years of diligent digging and questioning are the essence of strong, local reporting, the bedrock of excellence in journalism. It's also why she is this year's Sacred Cat honoree, a Milwaukee Press Club award that traditionally has gone to nationally known journalists.

NNA WOLFE HAD ONE IMPORTANT

Her passion in journalism was economic justice stories and the impact poverty had on so many lives. Mississippi is the nation's poorest state.

Wolfe's multi-year series, called The Backchannel, uncovered a criminal scandal showing how millions in welfare funds were misspent or stolen. Mississippi's state auditor called it the "largest public embezzlement case" in state history. It would be a daunting task to break through the bureaucracy barriers and secrecy from an agency that had not faced much public scrutiny, especially by a reporter who was relatively new, though not naive.

Earlier this year, Wolfe was awarded the 2023 Goldsmith Prize for Investigative Reporting, one of journalism's highest honors, for her series. It's her second Goldsmith - she received the first in 2021 along with numerous other national and regional awards as part of a team reporting on Mississippi's debtors' prisons.

On her twitter page, @ayewolfe suggests she's "complicating the narrative on poverty and providing job security to FOIA officers."

Wolfe's effort in The Backchannel series included filing Freedom of Information Act [FOIA] requests (90 to date), an ethics complaint with the state for slow response to records (she won), and lots of spreadsheets, occasional tips, and intuition.

"There were people along the way who raised questions about how this money was being used, and just how the agency was being run as a whole. But they didn't have details," Wolfe said.



Details that she says were not transparent from government officials. Records showed the money being spent or going to nonprofits, but something was missing. How was the money being used to help the poor? What were the measured results? All questions Wolfe kept asking.

"I didn't know exactly what was odd, because I had never done something where I had gotten that far into the background in state government - to know what looked weird and what was normal accounting."

A state auditor's investigation noticed things didn't look right and in 2020 six people were indicted, including the former Mississippi Department of Human Services Director who later pled guilty, and prominent officials from a nonprofit accused of defrauding millions from the government.

But the story was far from over.

Brett Favre's Alleged Connection

Wolfe grew up in Washington State but ended up in Mississippi, where she graduated from Mississippi State University with a degree in journalism.

She met Green Bay Packers legend and NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Brett Favre prior to his name turning up in documents she would discover while investigating the ever-expanding story.

"I knew who Brett Favre was. I knew he's, like, the favorite son of Mississippi.," Wolfe said.

Favre's favorite son status would later come into question.

Two years after the state auditor's report and multiple arrests, the story would take another dramatic turn, sparking headlines back in Wisconsin and throughout the nation.

"We published our big series that revealed text messages for the first time in this investigation in April of 2022," Wolfe said. "And those were the texts that were between the governor and Brett Favre."

The texts included messages about funding a new volleyball facility at Favre's alma mater and a start-up pharmaceutical company that he had invested in. Wolfe has reported that \$7.1 million in federal welfare funds went to the two projects, plus another \$1.1 million in speaking fees to Favre himself, which he has

Favre has denied any wrongdoing and has not been charged in the welfare scandal, but he is one of three dozen people named in a civil lawsuit seeking to recover misspent welfare funds.

It's been nearly five years since Wolfe asked that editor to give her a chance, and the questions that motivate her to keep digging to keep asking those questions - still drive her today.

"I don't feel satisfied yet. I don't feel that I've even scraped the surface on why poverty has perpetuated in Mississippi and the political structures that have ensured that Mississippi remains the most impoverished state in the country."

The Next Chapter

Despite entering his "third life," there is no slowing down Derek Mosley. BY BILL GLAUBER

who will give hours of their time to explain themselves, to let the public into their world.

And then, there's Derek Mosley, former

judge and passionate

foodie, civic booster and director of Marquette University Law School's Lubar Center for Public Policy Research and Civic Education.

He gives everything ... and more.

The day after I first interviewed Mosley in July 2016, I got to witness something utterly miraculous: his kidney transplant.

Milwaukee Journal Sentinel photographer Mark Hoffman and I were ushered into a surgical theater at Froedtert & the Medical College of Wisconsin to document the procedure, to tell the story of Mosley's journey from end-stage renal failure to a new life.

But because this was Mosley, and he would have it no other way, we were also there to tell the story of his donor and best friend, JoAnn Eiring, a municipal court judge in the Town of Brookfield.

This was her journey as well.

And it was all part of a larger story. The connection of two judges. One Black. One white. Forever bound by a kidney.

We watched the surgery, as Eiring's kidney was placed into a cooler and wheeled a few feet to the adjoining room. And we saw and marveled how that kidney fit into the palm of the hand of the skilled surgeon, who completed the transplant.

In revealing so much of himself, Mosley hoped to spur others to consider organ donation, especially within the African American community.

That's just his way.

"About 49 percent of the people waiting for a kidney are African-American yet we are the group least likely to be organ donors on our driver's licenses," he said. "I got the news out. It's important. We need these kidneys. You can give to another person and that can be your legacy."

Mosley, 52, is upbeat, personable and committed to helping others.

He's a native of Chicago whose interest in the law was fired by actor Blair Underwood's portrayal of an attorney on the old TV show "L.A. Law."

He was admitted to Marquette University Law School and came to Milwaukee, sight unseen.

And he fell in love.

With the city he now calls home.

And with his fellow law student who would become his wife, Kelly Cochrane.

They have two children, Kallan, and Kieran.

His career took him to a spot as an assistant district attorney for Milwaukee County, where he worked for 7.5 years. There, with another ADA, he started a community prosecution unit.

"We weren't stationed at the DA's office downtown," he said. "We were stationed in neighborhoods."

He had an office in the Police District 5 station and two other community locations.

"We dealt with neighbors first hand on urban blight issues, absentee landlord issues," he said. "It made it more real for me."

In 2002, Mosley gained an appointment as municipal court judge in Milwaukee, making him at the time the youngest African American to be appointed a judge in the state.

He spearheaded community court, "bringing court out of the courthouse and into the community, specifically for our homeless population."

"I would hold court either at the Rescue Mission or the Guest House [of Milwaukee]," he said. "We decided to hold court there to help them take care of the issues they had with us and to lift warrants so they were able to get into housing through Housing First, a Milwaukee County program."

He brought back the MEDAL Program

– Medicine, Engineering, Dentistry,
Architecture and Law. The aim was to take
middle school City of Milwaukee students,
primarily students of color, and introduce
them to people working in those five fields.
MEDAL is a partnership among the Medical
College of Wisconsin, MSOE, Marquette
Dental School, MATC and Marquette
Law School.

"It was Blair Underwood playing a fake character who got me into law," he said. "I wanted the students to see real people doing the work."

As a municipal judge he made a point to wear his robe, not just on the bench but during speeches in schools and appearances at other venues.

"I did that because I was trying to normalize Black men in black robes.



Because we have done a pretty good job of normalizing Black men in orange jumpsuits."

In 2020, he again went public with a medical problem. This time, it was his battle against COVID-19, during the early stages of the pandemic. He was hospitalized for 12 days in the intensive care unit at Froedtert and nearly placed on a ventilator.

He credited a registered nurse, Christin Lissmann, for shepherding him through the ordeal.

"When I was in the hospital, all I could do was watch TV," he said. "People were saying that COVID wasn't real, it was a hoax. I said I have to come out with this story whether I live or die."

In January, Mosley returned "home" to Marquette, succeeding former broadcast journalist Mike Gousha as head of the Lubar Center. There, he's trying to fulfill philanthropist Sheldon Lubar's mission to bring together people of different backgrounds and political viewpoints "to talk and discuss issues."

"We've siloed ourselves so much we can't even meet to talk about issues that are important to all of us. That's my goal. Everything I do at the center is focused on that goal."

He has brought new energy to this vital public forum, interviewing newsmakers and convening summits on important issues, such as reckless driving.

Mosley, a noted foodie, has even added what he calls heritage dinners to the Lubar Center menus. The first dinner featured four African American chefs who prepared meals that were introduced to the American palette by enslaved Africans.


"We wanted to bring people together to learn the little history about why we eat these foods," he said.

After health issues and a significant job change, Mosley is right where he wants to be.

"I feel like this is my third life. I feel like someone kept me around for a reason. I've got work to do and I want to do as much as I can."

Still in the Fight

George Stanley may have said goodbye to his post as top editor at the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* but his work to support essential local journalism continues. **BY JIM NELSON**

A

FTER MORE THAN 40 YEARS IN THE

news business, George Stanley's commitment to saving local journalism burns strong.

It's a challenge he knows well after leading the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* in a variety of positions, most recently as editor.

Despite ownership changes, cutbacks and the rise of distrust in the media, Stanley

remained focused on quality coverage.

"You don't have to be a reporter for long to learn how we solve problems and fight corruption in our democracy," he said. "People of goodwill work in every department, agency and company. They see wrongdoing and try to stop it from within, going through channels. When that doesn't work, they look for ways to bring it to light."

That's why it's so important to have reporters at meetings, hearings, courthouses and city halls, covering the news, he noted.

"They become the instruments for getting this key information to the public so that we can all demand better."

Such work builds trust, leads to tips and generates even more in-depth coverage, such as investigative projects that have won the Journal Sentinel national attention.

Under Stanley's leadership, the Journal Sentinel won virtually every major honor in journalism, including three Pulitzer Prizes.

Colleagues recognized Stanley's commitment to backing up reporters who were doing difficult, hard-hitting stories.

"For me, as a reporter and later an editor, there was no better feeling than stopping in his office to describe a story, seeing him drop what he was working on and spin the chair forward to hear what we had," said Greg Borowski, who succeeded Stanley as executive editor.

"You knew you really had him if he leaned forward and — eyes lit up — said something like: 'You know what that means?'

"Indeed. It usually meant we'd be off to the races on a kick-ass story."

Stanley was born in Laredo, Texas, where his father, Jim Stanley, was in the U.S. Air Force. Jim Stanley later worked in the paper industry, bringing the family to Green Bay.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Stanley joined the Milwaukee Sentinel in 1989 after reporting stints in Lake Geneva, Wichita and with Ducks Unlimited magazine. He was named business editor of the Sentinel in 1993 and took on the same position at the merged Journal Sentinel in 1995. In 1997, Stanley was named managing editor, working with the editor, Martin Kaiser, for 18 years.

He was named the paper's top editor in 2015, after Kaiser retired. Stanley and his wife, Pam, have five children including son Greg, an environmental reporter at the Minneapolis Star Tribune.

A love of Wisconsin, the outdoors and concern for the environment run deep in Stanley's blood and were reflected in the Journal Sentinel's coverage of the Great Lakes and other issues.

Navigating the financial challenges facing newsrooms became a big part of Stanley's job. As a result, he doubled down on finding alternative funding for newsrooms such as the Report for America program, which places emerging journalists in local newsrooms to report on undercovered issues and communities.


He also helped establish the O'Brien Fellowship in Public Service Journalism at Marquette University, which supports journalists from around the country, including the Journal Sentinel, in deep reporting of public-service stories.

Since retiring at the end of 2022, Stanley has worked for the Local News Initiative at Northwestern's Medill School of Journalism.

In his farewell column, Stanley recounted how while sifting through old files he had found a hand-written response to "Sum up your newsroom's mission in a sentence."

To give people the information they need to be free and govern themselves.

In 1973, members of the Milwaukee Press Club passed the hat to start what has become a multigeneration investment in the future of journalism. Decades of generosity and stewardship have grown MPC Endowment's assets. In 2022, the Endowment provided a record \$30,000 in awards.

One grant covered travel costs for UWM students in an immersive journalism class. Another helped pay both emerging and veteran journalists involved in a Milwaukee Film documentary on arts coverage amid the shrinking of traditional news media.





























